"Enemies"

But I say to you, love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, so that you may be sons of your Father in heaven.

Matthew 5:44-45 ESV (Monthly Watchword for July 2023)



Sometimes, things we read in the Bible are, shall we say, hard pills to swallow. God's Word is often like that in the way it confronts our sinful nature. These words of Jesus' Sermon on the Mount from the Gospel of Matthew are not just a hard pill to swallow. For me, they are like one of those giant horse pills that children and even many adults dread having to choke down.

These words are also thought provoking. I've read the entire Gospel of Matthew many times, but it wasn't until I sat down to write this article that I really reflected on this passage deeply.

Jesus speaks about "enemies." The first question I asked in my reflection was simply this: "Do I actually have any enemies?" To be sure, there are people with whom I disagree about things, and vice versa. There are many people I have met in life who are not, for various reasons, my close and personal friends. I suspect I am not alone in this. But I honestly had a hard time thinking of anyone I would classify in such a harsh way. How does someone qualify as our enemy? For what reason is someone our enemy? Is it a personal reason, or does it have to do with our faith? Jesus' words are relevant in either case, but it seems Jesus' comments are directed primarily to loving and praying for those who persecute Christians because of their faith. It was not uncommon for Christians to face such opposition, and Jesus' words speak to that reality.

In our time and part of the world, perhaps we have the luxury of not having such enemies, at least less often than other lands where Christian persecution is still common. For all that we observe about the declining influence of the Christian faith in our country, we still live in an area that is for the most part friendly to our faith, where we enjoy considerable freedom compared to other places. It is important to remember that disagreement does not necessarily equal hatred or persecution. Ralph Waldo Emerson once made the insightful comment: "Let me never fall into the vulgar mistake of dreaming that I am persecuted whenever I am contradicted."

But persecution against us can still unfortunately come our way. We might have people with whom we disagree, where such disagreements erupt even into hatred. We might encounter people who for whatever reason are opposed to us because of our faith in Jesus and our Christian life. How do we respond?

Christian faith comes with a cost. This is one of the paradoxes of our faith. On the one hand, our new life with God is a free gift of grace. We can't take credit for the new birth into a living hope we have through Jesus Christ. But on the other, having that faith also leads us into a new way of life, one that necessarily makes us uncomfortable with the world around us in light of the will of God. This includes everything, including how we relate to those around us.

When we are wronged by others, a mark of our sinful nature is the desire for revenge or at least what we call "schadenfreude," from the German words for "joy at the misfortune of others."

But Christian faith changes our outlook on ourselves and the rest of the world. We know that we have received grace from God, love that we do not deserve. And that leads us to look at others differently. As hard a pill as it is to swallow, God's love is for the whole world, even those opposed to us. And we do not

know how God is working in their lives. The Apostle Paul, for example, was the strongest opponent of early Christians, but God turned him in the other direction.

For these reasons, Jesus calls us to a posture of prayer when we are opposed. It is important to remember that love and prayer for others does not excuse harmful behavior. There is much that we can't control about what others might do. But we can control how we respond to it. It is a mark of our faith in our gracious God that we offer prayer for those who persecute us, that they might know the same grace we have received.

Fortunately, at Grace Lutheran, there are people willing to give of their time and talents for the care and maintenance of both the church and parsonage. This month's report illustrates the many volunteers who helped accomplish the following list of accomplishments:

More storage space for Backpack Ministry

- Scott Schultz and Bob Reynolds built extra wooden shelves in two of the closets in the Fellowship Hall. The Backpack Ministry now has 4 closets to store food and supplies.
- Kate Simmons and Beth Gilgien rearranged and organized the closets.
- Kelly O'Reilly and Pete Oberhauser moved two "heavy" solid wood doors, that were stored in one of the closets, to the room next to the balcony.
- The extra storage space will allow more food to be stored on site; plus, the food bags will take up less room on tables.

· Reorganized Quilt Closet

- Linda Keaser, Beth Raab, Kate Simmons, Diane Christensen, Jeni Lahman, Becky Winegardner and Casey Sigler all worked on this project.
- Tree Trimming/Removal (hired Broken Limb Tree Service)
 - Silver maple and blue spruce removed (with stump grinding) from front of parsonage garage
 - Sugar maple trimmed in backyard of parsonage
 - Four crab apple tree stumps ground up on north side of parsonage
 - Sugar maple trimmed in front of church (north side)
 - Rick Rockwell removed silver maple wood chips in front of parsonage garage.

New washer/dryer

Wanda and Terry Hupp researched options.

After VBS, Jonathan Roshon will install washer box, drain and waterlines for new washing machine. Core hole thru block wall for dryer vent, install vent cover and seal.

Second floor shower

- Discovered a water leak from second floor shower into Fellowship Hall.
- Jonathan Roshon resealed the shower drain and will also caulk around the base pan.
- Replaced damaged ceiling panel with a new one.

· New patio sliding screen door for parsonage

Library

- Karen Lewis, Valinda Arnold and Jeni Lahman continued to sort through and categorize books.

Lawn Care/Flower beds

- John Ulmer applied step 2 of Scotts 4 step fertilizer program on church lawn.
- Terry and Wanda Hupp treated weeds, planted a Hosta, and mulched flower bed on east side of church.
- Plans are to remove some old stumps and add more mulch to addition flower beds on east side.

Items for NALC Disaster Response

Items are now stored in Carl Lahman's garage in order to keep them separate from the sales items in August. Kaye Smith is checking to see when the NALC in this area is having another "Stuff the Truck" event.

Lawn Care Billing

 Discovered a problem with receiving invoices the past two months. Company resolved the issue.

· Dartball Board in Fellowship Hall

- Jim Lewis and Bob Reynolds modified the dartball board so it can be moved out of the Fellowship Hall when not in use.
- Ordered a sign to be put next to dumpster, indicating DUMPSTER NOT FOR PUBLIC USE. Will also be marking the pavement in front of dumpster with wording DO NOT BLOCK.

Future projects

- □ Clean carpet in Fellowship Hall after VBS. [This is part of the annual cleaning schedule.]
- Continue painting project of third floor classrooms.
- Have received an estimate to remove the blue spruce and white pine on the east side of the parsonage fence alongside the library exit driveway. One is dying and the other has grown into and around either a power or utility line. Both trees are in danger of causing damage in case of high wind.
- The pastor and family have expressed interest in installing an egress window in the basement bedroom at some point in the future. This is because the room is not currently a legal bedroom for insurance purposes. An egress window would make escape from the bedroom possible in the event of a fire. In the future, the children might benefit from each having separate rooms, and this would make that possible and legal.
- Remove the old kitchen cabinet in the hallway and replace it with another metal shelf for kitchen supplies.
- Looking into putting an outside water spigot on the north side of church for watering flowers and new grass seed.
- Build a soffit around the PVC pipes with drywall, located from the basement furnace room to the west side exit door, then reinstall the exit sign.

Looking for volunteers to help with:

- Power washing fence at parsonage
- In the fall, add top soil to the church's lawn and reseed in areas.

An offering was taken each day of money and groceries that is shared with Community Food Pantries at Thornville, Glenford, Somerset, and the Backpack Ministry. Over two trash bags of pop tabs were collected for the Ronald McDonald House at Children's Hospital. A great time for fun and fellowship was enjoyed by the children and the volunteers.






SEPARATION FROM SIN
