The Ten Commandments:

Introduction

I am the LORD your God. Exodus 20:2 ESV

Among the many things that people associate with the Christian faith, the Ten Commandments rank high on the list. It is common to see



Christian homes display replicas of the two stone tablets that God first gave to Moses in the time of the Old Testament. The Ten Commandments are certainly important, but there is some confusion about them and the role they play in Christian life. It is important to understand them properly and how they fit into our broader faith.

In the year 1528, Martin Luther took a tour of the churches in his general area. He wanted to see firsthand how life in the churches was being conducted. What he discovered shocked him. Later he wrote, "What misery I beheld." To his dismay, he learned that most church members and even the pastors themselves knew little to nothing about the Christian faith. For many years, people had been accustomed to practicing their faith through mere ritual observance. Luther felt strongly that people should know about basic matters of the faith so that they can actively participate with understanding. To that end, in 1529 he wrote his *Small Catechism* and *Large Catechism*. Both these books are still used in Lutheran congregations today.

When Martin Luther set out to explain the Christian faith in his *Small Catechism*, the first thing he did was list and explain what we know as the Ten Commandments. Throughout this year of 2024, I will devote these newsletter articles to discussing each of these Commandments.

The Ten Commandments are found in two places in the Old Testament. The first is Exodus chapter 20, where God gave Moses the Ten Commandments after God led the people out of slavery in Egypt and into freedom. The Ten Commandments are repeated in Deuteronomy chapter 5.

One surprising thing is that even though everyone agrees that there are ten of these commandments, Jews and Christians themselves disagree about how exactly to number the commandments. The Bible itself provides no system of numbering, and so different groups have interpreted differently what comprises separate commandments.

For example, Lutherans and Roman Catholics number the Ten Commandments in the following way:

- 1. I am the Lord your God. You shall have no other gods before me.
- 2. You shall not take the name of the Lord your God in vain.
- 3. Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy.
- 4. Honor your father and your mother.
- 5. You shall not kill.
- 6. You shall not commit adultery.
- 7. You shall not steal.
- 8. You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor.
- 9. You shall not covet your neighbor's house.
- 10. You shall not covet your neighbor's wife, his workers, or his livestock, or anything that is your neighbor's.

Most other Protestant churches, influenced by the Reformed theological perspective, number the Ten Commandments differently because they interpret the explanation of the first commandment as a separate commandment, dealing with the issue of worshiping "graven images" or "idols" rather than God Himself:

1. I am the Lord your God. You shall have no other gods before me.

- 2. You shall not make for yourself an idol, whether in form of anything that is in heaven above, or that is on the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth.
- 3. You shall not take the name of the Lord your God in vain.
- 4. Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy.
- 5. Honor your father and your mother.
- 6. You shall not kill.
- 7. You shall not commit adultery.
- 8. You shall not steal.
- 9. You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor.
- 10. You shall not covet.

Interestingly, many Jewish people number the Ten Commandments even differently than the two systems above. In the Hebrew language, the word that is translated as "commandments" (*davarim*) can mean "words" more generally. So, they sometimes refer to the Ten Commandments as the "Ten Words" that God spoke to His people. This is because Jews believe that the first "Word" that God spoke is not really a commandment at all, but simply a declaration:

- 1. I am the Lord your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of bondage.
- 2. You shall have no other gods beside me.
- 3. You shall not take the name of the Lord your God in vain.
- 4. Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy.
- 5. Honor your father and your mother.
- 6. You shall not kill.
- 7. You shall not commit adultery.
- 8. You shall not steal.
- 9. You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor.
- 10. You shall not covet.

I have come to believe that thinking of the Ten Commandments as the "Ten Words" is helpful for us as Lutherans. Martin Luther was clear that we do not earn our salvation by obeying the Ten Commandments. In fact, we cannot, as we do not possess the ability to live up to God's righteous standards. If we did, we would have no need for Jesus Christ to be our savior. Instead, just as God declared to the Israelite people that He had saved them from Egypt that He was their God before listing his expectations of them, we believe that God has first saved us through Jesus Christ and then gives us guidance for how to conduct ourselves.

The word "commandment" sometimes conjures negative images in our minds. Human beings do not always like rules. But we believe that the Ten Commandments are actually a precious gift from God. True, we do not earn our salvation by obeying them. But without guidance from God as we live our lives, chaos rules in our world. When these Ten Commandments are broken, there are often devastating consequences. When Martin Luther explained these commandments, he not only focused on what Christians should not do, but he explained what Christians should do in response to their faith in the God who graciously declared to us: "I am the Lord your God."

 - The original hope was that LifeWise would have 25 schools by 2025; they now have more than 300 public schools in 12 states, with 35,000 students enrolled.
 - The Northern Local LifeWise board is exploring the possibility to expand this program to middle and high school students.

Council President Carl Lahman: Reflections since joining Grace

Now that I am installed as council president, I thought this would be a good time to share some of my reflections since joining Grace.



It was September 27th of 2020 that my wife (Jeni) and I became members of Grace. We moved here from Heath where we lived for two years. Prior to that we lived in Columbus where we raised two children.

The reason we moved from Columbus to a condominium in Heath was to downsize and move closer to the country side and to enjoy a less hectic life style once I retired from DeVry University. Soon after we moved it was very important to us to find a new church. I grew up a Methodist and Jeni grew up a Lutheran, so when we got married 40 years ago, being a good husband, I became a Lutheran.

When we moved to Heath, we naturally looked for a Lutheran church, but for some reason, none of the Lutheran churches felt right. One day, a friend of mine invited us to join First Presbyterian in Granville. As I discovered, the theology of a Presbyterian church is much different than a Lutheran church. I also discovered that we were not ready for condominium living. So, we decided to move AGAIN and ended up here in Thornville. It didn't take long for Jeni to find Grace.

One of the first things I noticed at Grace is how old and how big this church is. If my calculations are correct, Grace is now 187 years old. With all the building additions and changes it is easy to get lost in this church. Secondly, I noticed there is a good mix of age groups. Thirdly, I noticed how friendly people are. And finally, I noticed that Grace is traditionally grounded.

Since becoming members Jeni and I found it easy to be part of the many "growing" ministries of Grace.

Have you ever heard someone talk about a "spiritual marker" in their life? A spiritual marker identifies a time when you clearly know that God has guided you. I often look back on my life and recognize the events in my life where God brought me to a particular place and time. It is a very revealing exercise that I recommend. However, it doesn't always answer the question, "why?" or "why me?", For example, I am NOT a handyman, so I often ask the question, "why was I the property coordinator these past couple of years?"

To summarize, Jeni and I have been truly blessed to be part of Grace. One of the things I noticed very quickly about this congregation is that there are a lot of gifted folks here. This church also thinks BIG. A good example of thinking "big" is our Worship Renewal Project. The future looks bright for Grace but we do have challenges like ensuring Grace's financial future. Filling the shoes of our previous council present, Paul Moentmann, will be challenging, so I ask for your support and prayers.

Finally, I would like to close with a description I heard long ago, at an ELCA Synod Conference, of a "flock of geese". This description is often used to describe healthy congregations, which reminds me of how healthy this congregation is. Here are 5 observations and their related church messages:

1. As each goose flaps its wings, it creates uplift for the bird immediately following. By flying in a "V" formation the

whole flock adds greater flying range than if each bird flew on its own.

The Message is: We can go somewhere more quickly and easily if we have a common direction and give a good uplift to one another rather than trying to tear each other down.

2. Whenever a goose falls out of formation it suddenly feels the drag and resistance of trying to go it alone. The goose will return to the formation quickly to benefit from the lifting power of the bird in front.

The Message is: We need the support of others.

3. If a goose in front gets tired, the goose simply rotates to the back of the formation and another goose goes to the front.

The Message is: No one has to do the difficult tasks all of the time and we don't do them alone.

4. At the back of the formation the geese constantly honk to encourage those up front to maintain their speed.

The Message is: Yes, folks you got to honk encouragement all of the time.

5. When a goose becomes ill or wounded, and falls from the sky, other geese will fall out of formation. They follow the other goose down to the ground to help and protect it. They remain until the fallen bird is able to fly again or until it dies."

The Message is: We stand by each other, in sickness and in health.

So, the next time you see a flock of geese, **listen for their** <u>honks</u> of encouragement. Let that be a reminder of how blessed we all are to be part of this church family.



The Fourth Petition

Give us this day our daily bread.

What does this mean?

God indeed gives daily bread to all, even unbelievers, without our prayer, but we pray in this petition that he would help us to recognize this so that we would receive our daily bread with thanksgiving.

What is meant by daily bread?

Daily bread includes everything required to meet our earthly needs, such as food, drink, clothing, home, property, employment, necessities; devout parents, children, and communities; honest and faithful authorities, good government, seasonable weather, peace, health, an orderly society, a good reputation, true friends and neighbors, and the like.

LifeWise is a blessing to our schools! Each week when the students come for class, they learn something new about Jesus.


