

The Controversy of Christmas

For my eyes have seen your salvation that you have prepared in the presence of all peoples. Luke 2:30-31 ESV (Monthly Watchword for December 2023)



"Keep Christ in Christmas." For

sincere Christians, this is a commonly repeated phrase this time of year. I understand and appreciate the point. What was originally intended as a spiritual observance for Christians with rich theological meaning regarding the incarnation of the Son of God has become over the last several decades a secular and commercialized mess. What many people consider "Christmas" is really a broader cultural "holiday season." There's nothing necessarily wrong with that. I also enjoy some secular holiday music and traditions and would miss them if they were gone.

But is it possible to get back to a kind of "pure" spiritual Christmas? Doing so is harder than it sounds. In fact, Christmas has had secular "baggage" attached to it for a long time, perhaps from the beginning. A brief history of Christmas is helpful in sorting this out.

The origin of Christmas as a holy day isn't quite clear. We do know that December 25 came to be observed by Christians in Rome sometime in the 300s A.D. as the "Feast of the Nativity" of our Lord Jesus. From there, it branched out to other locations. But how did we get the date of December 25?

Some claim that the date was chosen in the late 200s A.D. to compete with the pagan festival called "The Birthday of the

Invincible Sun." This is possible. But it seems more likely that Christians arrived at the date of December 25 in a different way. Many people of that time thought that the death and conception dates of famous figures coincided. Some considered Jesus' death to have occurred on March 25, which is possible. Hence, March 25 is the festival of the Annunciation of our Lord, when we remember that the angel Gabriel appeared to Mary and announced that she would bear the Son of God. Given the normal gestation period of nine months for human pregnancies, we arrive at December 25 as the birth of Jesus.

Whatever the case, the spiritual meaning of Christmas Day has more than once in history been overshadowed by secular observances, however important they might have been. In the year 800 A.D., the Frankish monarch Charlemagne was crowned "Emperor of the Romans" on Christmas Day. On Christmas Day in 1066 A.D., William the Conqueror was crowned as the first Norman king of England. Even centuries ago, people had a hard time "keeping Christ in Christmas."

Christmas has also not been universally loved and appreciated in all parts of the Christian world. In parts of Europe and America, Christmas as a holy day has been controversial. The man named Ulrich Zwingli (1484-1531) was a Protestant Reformer from Switzerland and was a contemporary of Martin Luther. Though they agreed on many things, their differences kept them apart. Zwingli is considered the originator of what would become the broader Reformed Protestant tradition. His point of view was that unless something is specifically commanded in the Bible, we should not do it. From his perspective, there was no such thing as Christmas because the Bible doesn't directly say to observe it. The Lutherans, however, had a different approach. Their view was that unless something is directly prohibited in the Bible, we have the freedom to do it. Most of American Christianity is influenced by the broader Reformed Protestant tradition that has its roots in Ulrich Zwingli's theology. Hence, for much of our history as a country, the Protestant religious establishment considered the observance of Christmas to be controversial. Puritan Christians in New England banned Christmas celebrations. Christmas was mostly a "thing" in America among the following Christian groups: Anglicans (Episcopalians), Catholics, and Lutherans. To this day, for example, the concept of a special Christmas Eve worship service is foreign to many churches. If you want to attend one, you usually need to look for an Anglican, Catholic, or Lutheran church.

Despite the lukewarm reception that many in our country had toward Christmas as a holiday, the "holiday spirit" could not be easily suppressed. Gradually, various states and eventually the federal government came to recognize Christmas Day as a holiday, even if it had more to do with giving people a break from work for a day than any spiritual significance. President Ulysses S. Grant signed a law in 1870 that made Christmas Day a holiday, at least for federal employees in the District of Columbia.

The growing popularity of Christmas in the United States after the Civil War is perhaps understandable since it was a time of change, expansion, and urbanization. Christmas as a holiday became a time when families could get together. It promoted community and provided the country with an opportunity for a common experience. Even many Jewish people, who do not believe in Jesus, came to see Christmas as an important secular observance. In a blending of sacred and secular traditions, the figure of "Santa Claus," based on the Christian figure of St. Nicholas, emerged as a symbol of Christmas. Though it didn't create Santa Claus, the Coca-Cola company helped popularize the figure of Santa in their advertising in the first half of the twentieth century. Which brings us to today. Christmas as a secular holiday is a big part of our Western civilization. It isn't going anywhere, and retailers rely on it for much of their revenue each year. If anything, the task of "keeping Christ in Christmas" falls to us in our daily lives. Amid the jingle bells, Rudolph's red nose so bright, and chestnuts roasting on an open fire, remember to pray, worship, and receive the gifts of Christ this season.

It is true that the Bible nowhere directly commands people to observe Christmas. But we have the freedom to do so, and we remember the truth of Christmas every time we profess our faith in the Apostles' and Nicene Creeds: "He was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit and born of the virgin Mary." Christmas is the great truth of the incarnation. God has come to us deep in the flesh and deep into our sinful world. He came out of love. He came for us. As we open our other presents this season, do not neglect the most important one, the one for which the man named Simeon waited in the temple so long ago.

Let us speak with him as he gazed on the infant Jesus: For my eyes have seen your salvation that you have prepared in the presence of all peoples.

- 7. Facilities Report Carl Lahman (Facilities Coordinator)
- Chapel door (next to choir room)
 - Installed a push/panic bar on the old chapel door, disabling previous faulty door knob lock.
- Flat screen TVs and whiteboard
 - Reattached two TVs and whiteboard on the upper-level classrooms after rooms were repainted.
- Fixed electrical panel box ground wire
 - Discovered that the entire kitchen panel ground was disconnected.

- Fall Cleanup
 - Pulled weeds on north and east side of church. Trimmed long grass bushes on north side of church.
 - Cleaned up leaves at both church and parsonage Saturday morning, Nov. 18th. Thanks everyone that helped: Pete, Paul, Terry, Will, Kelly, Pastor Tom, and Pastor Theresa.
- HVAC Electrical Data
 - Once again, kudos to Bob Reynolds and Dave Rodenbaugh for creating a much needed spreadsheet that identifies all thermostat locations with corresponding furnace locations, furnace breakers, outside A/C unit locations and A/C unit breakers.
- Furnace Filters
 - Dave Rodenbaugh has offered to replace, on a regular basis, all furnace filters (at no cost) for both church and parsonage (6 furnaces at church and 1 furnace at parsonage).
 - Will negotiate with Fairfield Heating & Cooling to see how much less they will charge on next year's maintenance agreement.
- Unsecured exterior door
 - Jim Lewis discovered that the south west doors across from the door to the Fellowship Hall does not always lock properly. It appears that when locking the door from the inside, the panic push bar is not activating the long up-and-down locking pins.

- Electrical breakers
 - Bob Reynolds and Dave Rodenbaugh are almost done identifying all the electrical breakers in the church building. There remains a couple of puzzling loose ends to finish.
- Facility Coordinator
 - Working on finding a Facility Coordinator replacement

next year for.

• Working on redefining the job the Facility Coordinator to be more of a "contact person" that delegates to specific people that oversee important area. For example, HVAC, electrical and lawn care/landscaping.

8. Old Business

- Elevator Maintenance Agreement
 - It was discovered that our agreement is automatically renewed for successive 5-year periods. It was last renewed in 2021, which means we must wait until 2026 to decide if we want to continue with the same company.
 - Council decided to send a letter requesting a meeting to discuss changes to the current agreement before renewing again.
 - Council also agreed that, unless there is an emergency, we never request services outside of normal business working days and hours because the current overtime rate is \$850/hr.

9. New Business

 - A motion was made by Vicki and seconded by Matt to give 50% each to Lutheran Church of South Sudan and the NALC pastor internship fund. Motion passed.

Mary's Annual Report for NALC Disaster Response - 2023

<u>Ohio Train Derailment Feb. 3, 2023</u> — a Norfolk Southern train carrying hazardous cargo derailed in East Palestine OH, a town of 4,047 families. 31 pallets of cleaning supplies/flood buckets have been delivered through our NALC congregation, Good Hope Lutheran Boardman OH.

Arkansas Tornado Outbreak Mar. 31, 2023 - Over 200 tornadoes broke out in Arkansas the evening of March 31, proceeding through 7 states: Arkansas, Iowa, Missouri, Tennessee, Illinois, Indiana, and Mississippi. Thousands of homes are destroyed and over 30 people died. The town of Wynne, AR is wiped out. Regional disaster warehouses delivered emergency relief supplies to Keota and Hedrick in Iowa, Whiteland in Indiana, Elizabethtown Kentucky, Little Rock Arkansas and Wynne Arkansas, and several additional communities. Long term recovery will be extensive.

Oklahoma Tornadoes Apr. 19, 2023 - 3 EF-4 tornadoes struck the Shawnee/Cole area of Oklahoma City, killing 3 people. The NALC congregation Peace Lutheran has responded with emergency relief supplies & volunteers.

NALC Disaster Response continues to:

- Conduct disaster preparedness trainings: 9 disaster preparedness trainings and 1 "train the trainer" event.
- 12 NALC Disaster Response Sundays have been held. Gift cards are really needed!
- Coordinate servant event mission trips 22 volunteer teams of youth and adults have completed servant event mission trips to date thank you Jesus!
- Hold "Stuff the Truck" events 29 Stuff the Truck events have been held in addition to numerous deliveries to our warehouses.





- 6. That any ministry based on our Purpose, Mission, Vision and Core Values is valid for our congregation, and may, at any time, evolve or end.
